SICHT & SCROLL · A TWELVE-HOUR EXERCISE

FEAST - SAVORING THE WORD OF COD

When you open the Bible, be expectant, immerse yourself in it's language, look at a passage from a variety of perspectives, and study it long enough to learn something new.

TO CET YOU STARTED

Turn to Isaiah 35:5-7. Ask God what He wants to show you.



Then will the eyes of the blind be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped.

Then will the lame leap like a deer, and the mute tongue shout for joy.

Water will gush forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert.

The burning sand will become a pool, the thirsty ground bubbling springs.

In the haunts where jackals once lay, grass and reeds and papyrus will grow.

As you read these verses, pay attention to the imagery, the patterns, and the line breaks. Notice what these verses say and why.

Read the passage again, this time aloud. Listen to the words and the cadence of the language itself. When you're ready, consider the questions below.

- · What is the tone or feeling of the passage?
- Which words catch your attention?
- Which phrases give you pause?
- Are you surprised by anything in the passage? If so, what?
- What purpose does punctuation serve?
- What is God saying to you through these verses?

These verses from the book of Isaiah are filled with rich and vivid imagery. God sees and cares deeply for His people and His world. He has a plan. He will restore the years the locusts have eaten, and He will, in His own time and in His own way, heal His children, restore earth's lack, and quench creation's collective thirst.
